Michael Robinson and **David Hill**, landscape architecture faculty in the School of Architecture, will work with the Town of Section to develop a sustainable rural design plan, draft a zoning ordinance and develop a brand for the community. Goals for the project include identifying cultural, recreational, architectural and business projects that will form an identifiable anchor for the community's progress. As a result, the Town of Section will be able to create a more diversified and resilient economy while conserving its cultural heritage and traditions. The project is supported by a \$50,000 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC). The ARC is supporting this project as part of its goal to develop and improve Appalachia's infrastructure to make the region economically competitive.

School of Architecture faculty **David Hinson** and **Ryan Salvas** have received funding support from the College of Architecture, Design, and Construction and the Auburn University Intramural Grants program for a project titled, "Curtain Wall Failure Diagnostics: Prevention through Linked Material Forensics and Thermal Imaging." The research project will use thermal imagery, material samples, and contextual measured data to better understand the performance of curtain wall assembly systems beyond the notions of increased energy usage. Salvas and Hinson will collaborate with **Mark Tatum**, Assistant Professor in the McWhorter School of Building Science and **Jerry Davis**, Associate Professor in the Department of Industrial and Systems Engineering.

Prof.'s David Hinson and Christian Dagg received an Honorable Mention and the Member's Choice Award in the 2010 Montgomery AIA Design Awards program for The House on Hickory Hill, a custom residence in Auburn, Alabama. The project was completed through their practice, Hinson + Dagg Architects. The Lusche Residence, another project of Hinson + Dagg Architects, is the subject of a feature story in the January / February 2011 issue of ecoHome magazine. During Fall Semester 2010, two teams of students from Auburn's new graduate program in collaborative design and construction participated in the Chase Community Development Competition, sponsored by the Chase Bank and Enterprise Community Partners. The Auburn teams, comprised of students in the design track and the construction track of this program, worked with two New Orleans non-profit community organizations: Neighborhood Development Foundation New Orleans and Old Algiers Main Street Corporation. The six-member Old Algiers Main Street team was selected as one of five finalists in the competition. The Master of Design Build program is co-directed by architecture faculty member **Josh Emig** and building science faculty member **Paul Holley**.
